Rhythm의 단위!

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What is 'Rhythm'?

Meter/Rhythm(운율):

the pattern of accented(stressed) and unaccented(unstressed) syllables

What is 'Rhythm'?

"Beware the Jabberwock my son!

The jaws that bite the claws that catch!

Beware the Jubjub bird and shun

The frumious Bandersnatch!"

And, as in uffish thought he stood.

The Jabberwock with eyes of flame,

Came whifeling through the tulgey wood,
